Regular Meeting

November 9, 2020

Mayor Laggis opened the meeting at 7:02. In addition to Mayor Laggis at the meeting were Councilman Gilson, Councilman Carden and Councilman Wright. The minutes from the October meeting were approved unanimously with Councilman Carden making the motion and Councilman Gilson seconding it. While presenting the Financial Report, Mayor Laggis told the Council that he had received notification that the Cares Funding had been deposited into our account, and since we had declined it, they were asking for a refund. Mayor Laggis looked into this and found that the money had never been deposited, so no refund was cut. The Financial Report was approved with Councilman Gilson making the motion. He was seconded by Councilman Wright and the motion carried unanimously.

Old Business

- 1. EMS Breakfast Set for Saturday December 5, at 9:00am.
- 2. Hall Rental Updates Year-to-Date there have been 15 bookings with 2 cancelling due to COVID concerns. Several are scheduled within the next few weeks. Total revenue is approximately \$2800.
- 3. Other Councilman Wright informed the Council that the siren at Lake Horton did not go off due to a glitch in the software, which has now been resolved. Mayor Laggis said that there had been a complaint in regards to a property owner not complying with Zoning Regulations. The owner has been made aware and they have agreed to comply within an agreed upon period of time.

New Business

- 1. Exterior Building Cleaning Ryan Mitchell pressure washed the outside of the building at no cost. Mayor Laggis asked the Clerk to put a "shout out" on the Woolsey Community Facebook page for his Ryan's business Extreme Contracting Pressure Washing.
- 2. Other The Fayette County Historical Society is starting to plan the Bicentennial of Fayette County. They are having a meeting next Sunday and the Mayor asked Councilman Gilson to be the representative for Woolsey. The Mayor asked Councilman Wright to be the representative of Woolsey for the committee for the 20 year anniversary of 9/11. Both Councilmen agreed to his request. In attendance at the meeting was a new resident, who moved to Woolsey to get away from noise, construction, etc. but then saw the new subdivision signs. Councilman Carden explained the Zoning information and how little land was/is available for development in the Town at this time.

With no more business to come before the council, the meeting was adjourned at 7:55 pm.
